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1.0 Introduction

IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS 9.2 has two types of release; a Long Term Support (LTS) release and a Continuous Delivery (CD) release. The differences between these two are documented in detail at https://www.ibm.com/docs/SSFKSJ_9.2.0/com.ibm.mq.pla.doc/q004715_.htm. This program directory describes installation of the FMIDs associated with the Long Term Support release.

This program directory is intended for system programmers who are responsible for program installation and maintenance. It contains information about the material and procedures associated with the installation of IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS. This publication refers to IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS as IBM MQ Advanced.

The Program Directory contains the following sections:

- 6.0, “Installation Instructions” on page 13 provides detailed installation instructions for IBM MQ Advanced. It also describes the procedures for activating the functions of IBM MQ Advanced, or refers to appropriate publications.

Before installing IBM MQ Advanced, read the *CBPDO Memo To Users* and the *CBPDO Memo To Users Extension* that are supplied with this program in softcopy format and this program directory; after which, keep the documents for your reference. Section 3.2, “Preventive Service Planning” on page 6 tells you how to find any updates to the information and procedures in this program directory.

IBM MQ Advanced is supplied in a Custom-Built Product Delivery Offering (CBPDO, 5751-CS3). The program directory that is provided in softcopy format on the CBPDO is identical to the hardcopy format if one was included with your order. All service and HOLDDATA for IBM MQ Advanced are included on the CBPDO.

Do not use this program directory if you install IBM MQ Advanced with a SystemPac or ServerPac. When you use one of those offerings, use the jobs and documentation supplied with the offering. The offering will point you to specific sections of this program directory as needed.

1.1 IBM MQ Advanced Description

IBM MQ Advanced provides the Managed File Transfer feature, the Advanced Message Security feature and the Connector Pack component. Each of these are independent of the other and can be used as required. For example you may decide to make use of the Advanced Message Security feature and the Connector Pack component, but not the Managed File Transfer feature.

IBM MQ for z/OS enables z/OS applications to use message queuing to participate in message-driven processing. With message-driven processing, applications can communicate across different platforms by using the appropriate MQ products. All MQ products implement a common application programming interface whatever platform the applications run on. The calls made by the applications and the messages they exchange are common.

The Managed File Transfer feature of IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS extends IBM MQ for z/OS to allow the transfer of files between systems in a managed and auditable way, regardless of file size or the operating systems used. Installation of the Managed File Transfer feature is performed by following the instructions in the IBM MQ for z/OS Program Directory (GI13-4449) and ensuring that the JMS9207 FMID is selected in the **CSQ8ASYJ** job.

The Advanced Message Security feature extends IBM MQ for z/OS by enabling messages flowing over IBM MQ to be encrypted so that the message contents remain secure between sending and receiving applications. These applications can be running on z/OS or other supported platforms and the applications do not require changing to make use of the capabilities of the Advanced Message Security feature. There is no installation necessary for the Advanced Message Security feature. Customization of the Advanced Message Security feature is described in the Configuring Advanced Message Security for z/OS section of the IBM MQ product documentation in IBM Documentation. The Connector Pack component contains the IBM Aspera faspio Gateway, which can be used to improve the throughput of message channels over high latency, lossy networks.

Important

IBM MQ Advanced only gives entitlement to the Managed File Transfer feature, the Advanced Message Security feature and the Connector Pack component. Separate entitlement to IBM MQ for z/OS, IBM MQ for z/OS VUE or IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS VUE is required to install and run the queue managers that are needed by these features and components.

Important

HMS9200, JMS9201, JMS9202, JMS9203, JMS9204, JMS9205, JMS9206 and JMS9208 provide the queue manager and associated capabilities. These FMIDs should only be installed, and must only be used, if you have entitlement to one or more of: IBM MQ for z/OS, IBM MQ for z/OS VUE or IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS VUE.

2.0 Program Materials

An IBM program is identified by a program number. The program number for IBM MQ Advanced is 5655-AV9.

Basic Machine-Readable Materials are materials that are supplied under the base license and are required for the use of the product.

The program announcement material describes the features supported by IBM MQ Advanced. Ask your IBM representative for this information if you have not already received a copy.

2.1 Basic Machine-Readable Material

The distribution medium for this program is physical media or downloadable files. This program is in SMP/E RELFILE format and is installed by using SMP/E. See 6.0, "Installation Instructions" on page 13 for more information about how to install the program.

You can find information about the physical media for the basic machine-readable materials for IBM MQ Advanced in the *CBPDO Memo To Users Extension*.

3.2 Preventive Service Planning

Before you install IBM MQ Advanced, make sure that you have reviewed the current Preventive Service Planning (PSP) information. Review the PSP Bucket for General Information, Installation Documentation, and the Cross Product Dependencies sections. For the Recommended Service section, instead of reviewing the PSP Bucket, it is recommended you use the IBM.PRODUCTINSTALL-REQUIREDSERVICE fix category in SMP/E to ensure you have all the recommended service installed. Use the **FIXCAT(IBM.PRODUCTINSTALL-REQUIREDSERVICE)** operand on the **APPLY CHECK** command.

If you obtained IBM MQ Advanced as part of a CBPDO, HOLDDATA is included.

If the CBPDO for IBM MQ Advanced is older than two weeks by the time you install the product materials, you can obtain the latest PSP Bucket information by going to the following website:

4.0 Program and Service Level Information

This section identifies the program and relevant service levels of IBM MQ Advanced. The program level refers to the APAR fixes that have been incorporated into the program. The service level refers to the PTFs that have been incorporated into the program.

4.1 Program Level Information

APARs for the Managed File Transfer feature are described in the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449). No APARS have been incorporated into the Connector Pack component.

4.2 Service Level Information

No PTFs against this release of IBM MQ Advanced have been incorporated into the product package.

Frequently check the IBM MQ Advanced PSP Bucket for HIPER and SPECIAL attention PTFs against all FMIDs that you must install. You can also receive the latest HOLDDATA, then add the **FIXCAT(IBM.PRODUCTINSTALL-REQUIRESERVICE)** operand on your **APPLY CHECK** command. This will allow you to review the recommended and critical service that should be installed with your FMIDs.

5.0 Installation Requirements and Considerations

The following sections identify the system requirements for installing and activating IBM MQ Advanced. The following terminology is used:

- *Driving system*: the system on which SMP/E is executed to install the program.

The program might have specific operating system or product level requirements for using processes, such as binder or assembly utilities during the installation.

- *Target system*: the system on which the program is configured and run.

The program might have specific product level requirements, such as needing access to the library of another product for link-edits. These requirements, either mandatory or optional, might directly affect the element during the installation or in its basic or enhanced operation.

In many cases, you can use a system as both a driving system and a target system. However, you can make a separate IPL-able clone of the running system to use as a target system. The clone must include copies of all system libraries that SMP/E updates, copies of the SMP/E CSI data sets that describe the system libraries, and your PARMLIB and PROCLIB.

Use separate driving and target systems in the following situations:

- When you install a new level of a product that is already installed, the new level of the product will replace the old one. By installing the new level onto a separate target system, you can test the new level and keep the old one in production at the same time.
- When you install a product that shares libraries or load modules with other products, the installation can disrupt the other products. By installing the product onto a separate target system, you can assess these impacts without disrupting your production system.

5.1 Driving System Requirements

This section describes the environment of the driving system required to install IBM MQ Advanced.

5.1.1 Machine Requirements

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the driving system requirements.

5.1.2 Programming Requirements

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's programming requirements.

Additionally, the Connector Pack component is installed into a file system. Before installing the Connector Pack component, you must ensure that the target system file system data sets are available for

processing on the driving system. OMVS must be active on the driving system and the target system file system data sets must be mounted on the driving system.

zFS must be active on the driving system. Information on activating and using zFS can be found in IBM Documentation at <https://www.ibm.com/docs/zos/2.5.0?topic=administration-zfs-guide>

5.2 Target System Requirements

This section describes the environment of the target system required to install and use IBM MQ Advanced.

IBM MQ Advanced installs in the z/OS (Z038) SREL.

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the individual product's target system requirements.

5.2.1 Machine Requirements

The target system can run in any hardware environment that supports the required software. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's machine requirements.

5.2.2 Programming Requirements

5.2.2.1 Installation Requisites

Installation requisites identify products that are required and *must* be present on the system or products that are not required but *should* be present on the system for the successful installation of this product.

Mandatory installation requisites identify products that are required on the system for the successful installation of this product. These products are specified as PREs or REQs.

IBM MQ Advanced has no installation requisites. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's installation requisites.

Conditional installation requisites identify products that are *not* required for successful installation of this product but can resolve such things as certain warning messages at installation time. These products are specified as IF REQs.

IBM MQ Advanced has no conditional installation requisites. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's conditional installation requisites.

5.2.2.2 Operational Requisites

Operational requisites are products that are required and *must* be present on the system or products that are not required but *should* be present on the system for this product to operate all or part of its functions.

Mandatory operational requisites identify products that are required for this product to operate its basic functions.

IBM MQ Advanced has no mandatory operational installation requisites. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's mandatory operational requisites.

Conditional operational requisites identify products that are *not* required for this product to operate its basic functions but are required at run time for this product to operate specific functions. These products are specified as IF REQs. Conditional operational requisites for the Managed File Transfer feature are in the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449). Conditional operational requisites for the Advanced Message Security feature are shown in Figure 5.

The Connector Pack component has no conditional operational requisites.

5.2.2.3 Toleration/Coexistence Requisites

Toleration/coexistence requisites identify products that must be present on sharing systems. These systems can be other systems in a multisystem environment (not necessarily sysplex), a shared DASD environment (such as test and production), or systems that reuse the same DASD environment at different time intervals.

IBM MQ Advanced has no toleration/coexistence requisites. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's toleration/coexistence requisites.

5.2.2.4 Incompatibility (Negative) Requisites

Negative requisites identify products that must *not* be installed on the same system as this product.

IBM MQ Advanced has no incompatibility (negative) requisites. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's incompatibility (negative) requisites.

5.2.3 DASD Storage Requirements

IBM MQ Advanced libraries can reside on all supported DASD types.

IBM MQ Advanced installs into the global, target and distribution zones previous created through the installation of IBM MQ for z/OS. There are no additional space requirements for IBM MQ Advanced.

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's DASD storage requirements.

5.3 FMIDs Deleted

Installing IBM MQ Advanced might result in the deletion of other FMIDs. To see which FMIDs will be deleted, examine the ++VER statement in the SMPMCS of the product.

If you do not want to delete these FMIDs at this time, install IBM MQ Advanced into separate SMP/E target and distribution zones.

Note: These FMIDs are not automatically deleted from the Global Zone. If you want to delete these FMIDs from the Global Zone, use the SMP/E REJECT NOFMID DELETEFMID command. See the SMP/E manuals for instructions.

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the FMIDs deleted by the individual products.

5.4 Special Considerations

IBM MQ Advanced has no special considerations for the target system. See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the product's special considerations for the target system.

5.4.1 SMP/E Considerations

IBM MQ Advanced must be installed into the same SMP/E zones, including SMPCSI, target, distribution, and zFS data sets as IBM MQ for z/OS. This Program Directory provides sample jobs and instructions to do this.

See the Program Directory for IBM MQ for z/OS (GI13-4449) for details of the individual product's SMP/E considerations.

6.0 Installation Instructions

This chapter describes the installation method and the step-by-step procedures to install and to activate the functions of IBM MQ Advanced.

Please note the following points:

- You can use the sample jobs that are provided to perform part or all of the installation tasks. The SMP/E jobs assume that all DDDEF entries that are required for SMP/E execution have been defined in appropriate zones.
- You can use the SMP/E dialogs instead of the sample jobs to accomplish the SMP/E installation steps.

6.1 Installing IBM MQ Advanced

The installation of IBM MQ Advanced is effected by installing the Managed File Transfer feature FMID included in IBM MQ for z/OS. Follow the installation instructions in the IBM MQ for z/OS Program Directory (GI13-4449) to install JMS9207. Once the installation is complete you should also refer to 6.1.8, “Cleaning Up Obsolete Data Sets, Paths, and DDDEFs” on page 17 and 6.2, “Activating IBM MQ Advanced” on page 18 of this document.

There is no installation necessary for the Advanced Message Security feature. Customization of the Advanced Message Security feature is described in the Configuring Advanced Message Security for z/OS section of the IBM MQ product documentation in IBM Documentation. Details can be found at: https://www.ibm.com/docs/SSFKSJ_9.2.0/com.ibm.mq.con.doc/q019097_.htm.

If Connector Pack component functionality is required then FMID HAV9200 must be installed into the SMP/E zones containing the HMS9200 and JMS9208 FMIDs. The zones are created when you follow the installation instructions for IBM MQ for z/OS. You must complete the installation of IBM MQ for z/OS before proceeding with the installation of the Connector Pack component by following the instructions below.

6.1.1 SMP/E Considerations for Installing IBM MQ Advanced

Use the SMP/E RECEIVE, APPLY, and ACCEPT commands to install this release of IBM MQ Advanced.

6.1.2 Sample Jobs

The following sample installation jobs are provided as part of the product to help you install the Connector Pack component.

The sample installation jobs are sorted by name into an order in which to run them in sequence (after editing) to install the Connector Pack component. The exact order in which to run the jobs is not

absolutely critical. Running the jobs in either the sequence they are listed in the list below or in the text of this chapter is acceptable.

You can access the sample installation jobs by performing an SMP/E RECEIVE (refer to 6.1.3, “Perform SMP/E RECEIVE” on page 14) then copy the jobs from the SMPTLIB data sets to a work data set for editing and submission. See Figure 6 to find the appropriate data set.

You can also copy the sample installation jobs from the product files by submitting the following job. Before you submit the job, add a job card and change the lowercase parameters to uppercase values to meet the requirements of your site.

See the following information to update the statements in the previous sample:

IN:

filevol is the volume serial of the DASD device where the downloaded files reside.

OUT:

jcl-library-name is the name of the output data set where the sample jobs are stored.

dasdvol is the volume serial of the DASD device where the output data set resides.

6.1.3 Perform SMP/E RECEIVE

If you have obtained IBM MQ Advanced as part of a CBPDO, use the RCVPDO job in the CBPDO RIMLIB data set to receive the IBM MQ Advanced FMIDs, service, and HOLDDATA that are included on the CBPDO package. For more information, see the documentation that is included in the CBPDO.

You can also choose to edit and submit sample job CSQ8A1RC to perform the SMP/E RECEIVE for the Connector Pack component. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.1.4 Allocate SMP/E Target and Distribution Libraries

All data sets used by IBM MQ Advanced are allocated by other products, so no new allocations are required.

6.1.5 Create DDDEF Entries

All DDDEFs used by IBM MQ Advanced are created by other products, so no new DDDEFs are required.

6.1.6 Perform SMP/E APPLY

1. Ensure that you have the latest HOLDDATA; then edit and submit sample job CSQ8A2AP to perform an SMP/E APPLY CHECK for the Connector Pack component. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

The latest HOLDDATA is available through several different portals, including <https://service.software.ibm.com/holdata/390holddata.html>. The latest HOLDDATA may identify HIPER and FIXCAT APARs for the FMIDs you will be installing. An APPLY CHECK will help you determine if any HIPER or FIXCAT APARs are applicable to the FMIDs you are installing. If there are any applicable HIPER or FIXCAT APARs, the APPLY CHECK will also identify fixing PTFs that will resolve the APARs, if a fixing PTF is available.

You should install the FMIDs regardless of the status of unresolved HIPER or FIXCAT APARs. However, do not deploy the software until the unresolved HIPER and FIXCAT APARs have been analyzed to determine their applicability. That is, before deploying the software either ensure fixing PTFs are applied to resolve all HIPER or FIXCAT APARs, or ensure the problems reported by all HIPER or FIXCAT APARs are not applicable to your environment.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do *not* bypass the PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ on the APPLY CHECK. The SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of *errors* and not of *warnings* (SMP/E treats bypassed PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ conditions as warnings, instead of errors).

Here are sample APPLY commands:

- a. To ensure that all recommended and critical service is installed with the FMIDs, receive the latest HOLDDATA and use the APPLY CHECK command as follows

```
APPLY S(fmid,fmid,...) CHECK
FORFMID(fmid,fmid,...)
SOURCEID(RSU*)
FIXCAT(IBM.ProductInstall-RequiredService)
GROUPEXTEND .
```

Some HIPER APARs might not have fixing PTFs available yet. You should analyze the symptom flags for the unresolved HIPER APARs to determine if the reported problem is applicable to your

environment and if you should bypass the specific ERROR HOLDs in order to continue the installation of the FMIDs.

This method requires more initial research, but can provide resolution for all HIPERs that have fixing PTFs available and are not in a PE chain. Unresolved PEs or HIPERs might still exist and require the use of BYPASS.

- b. To install the FMIDs without regard for unresolved HIPER APARs, you can add the BYPASS(HOLDCLASS(HIPER)) operand to the APPLY CHECK command. This will allow you to install FMIDs even though one or more unresolved HIPER APARs exist. After the FMIDs are installed, use the SMP/E REPORT ERRSYSMODS command to identify unresolved HIPER APARs and any fixing PTFs.

FIXCAT(IBM.ProductInstall-RequiredService)

This method is quicker, but requires subsequent review of the Exception SYSMOD report produced by the REPORT ERRSYSMODS command to investigate any unresolved HIPERs. If you have received the latest HOLDDATA, you can also choose to use the REPORT MISSINGFIX command and specify Fix Category IBM.PRODUCTINSTALL-REQUIREDSERVICE to investigate missing recommended service.

If you bypass HOLDs during the installation of the FMIDs because fixing PTFs are not yet available, you can be notified when the fixing PTFs are available by using the APAR Status Tracking (AST) function of ServiceLink or the APAR Tracking function of ResourceLink.

2. After you take actions that are indicated by the APPLY CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the APPLY.

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E applies all requisite SYSMODs. The requisite SYSMODS might be applicable to other functions.

6.1.7 Perform SMP/E ACCEPT

Edit and submit sample job CSQ8A3AC to perform an SMP/E ACCEPT CHECK for the Connector Pack component. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do *not* bypass the PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ on the ACCEPT CHECK. The SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause of *errors*

but not *warnings* (SMP/E treats bypassed PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ conditions as warnings rather than errors).

Before you use SMP/E to load new distribution libraries, it is recommended that you set the ACCJCLIN indicator in the distribution zone. In this way, you can save the entries that are produced from JCLIN in the distribution zone whenever a SYSMOD that contains inline JCLIN is accepted. For more information about the ACCJCLIN indicator, see the description of inline JCLIN in the SMP/E Commands book for details.

After you take actions that are indicated by the ACCEPT CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the ACCEPT.

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E accepts all requisite SYSMODs. The requisite SYSMODS might be applicable to other functions.

Expected Return Codes and Messages from ACCEPT CHECK: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

If PTFs that contain replacement modules are accepted, SMP/E ACCEPT processing will link-edit or bind the modules into the distribution libraries. During this processing, the Linkage Editor or Binder might issue messages that indicate unresolved external references, which will result in a return code of 4 during the ACCEPT phase. You can ignore these messages, because the distribution libraries are not executable and the unresolved external references do not affect the executable system libraries.

Expected Return Codes and Messages from ACCEPT: You will receive a return code of 0 if this job runs correctly.

6.2 Activating IBM MQ Advanced

Important

IBM MQ Advanced only gives entitlement to the Managed File Transfer feature, the Advanced Message Security feature and the Connector Pack component. Separate entitlement to IBM MQ for z/OS, IBM MQ for z/OS VUE, or IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS VUE is required to install and run the queue managers that are needed by these features and components.

In addition to FMIDs JMS9207 and HAV9200, IBM MQ Advanced contains HMS9200, JMS9201, JMS9202, JMS9203, JMS9204, JMS9205, JMS9206, JMS9208 which provide the queue manager and associated capabilities. These FMIDs should only be installed, and must only be used, if you have entitlement to one or more of: IBM MQ for z/OS, IBM MQ for z/OS VUE or IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS VUE.

If you mount the file system in which you have installed IBM MQ Advanced in read-only mode during execution, then you do not have to take further actions to activate IBM MQ Advanced.

You have now installed IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS. Before you can start to use IBM MQ Advanced for z/OS, it must be customized. This is described in the Configuring Managed File Transfer for z/OS and Configuring Advanced Message Security for z/OS sections of the IBM MQ product documentation in IBM Documentation.
